
The Grand Hotel offers 2 options for TMW 2024:

8.30-10.00 pm approx. The Torbay Recital 1 Celebrated classical guitarist John Mills and cello soloist Andrew Fuller present Latin Serenade, a musical tour of Spain and Latin America. From flamenco to tango and classical Spanish guitar to bossa nova, the recital will feature music by de Falla, Granados, Piazzolla, Villa-Lobos, Casals and Cassadó from their recent CD release on Meridian Records.

4.30-6.00 pm 'The Sorcerer of Bayreuth' Richard Wagner was without question one of the most influential artists who ever lived, and his influence was enormous and divisive from the late 19th century and into the 20th. David Bednall will show that this influence is still felt today and extends from music through to the presentation of film in the cinema. Whilst few would doubt Wagner's musical genius, the works still have a reputation for being impenetrable and difficult, and his personal life was controversial.

David will explore one of the most important cultural figures of all time for beginners and true Wagnerians alike - an opportunity to be converted or extend your knowledge and understanding of the methods and language of this most deified, demonized, and divisive genius.

Tony Rawlins will describe how classical music has enhanced the drama/tension/romance of feature films; how it has made some TV commercials really memorable and how a work by an obscure 17th century German composer has become our chosen Number 1 music for weddings and funerals. Also, how the internet has assembled and recorded a choir of over 8,000 singers from 120 countries - without any of them ever having to leave their homes, and, how classical music's melodies and chord sequences

have been borrowed for a huge number of popular hits. Tony will demonstrate by singing and playing the guitar.

Tales from Vienna 4.30-6.00 pm

Mozart, Haydn, Gluck, Beethoven, Schubert, Brahms, Strauss, Mahler, Bruckner, Schoenberg – it reads like a list of the great and good in classical music – but the amazing thing is that every

one of these musical geniuses lived and worked in Vienna. So just what was it about Vienna? What were the special qualities that enabled one city to foster such a golden age for music? Emma Johnson reveals that this explosion of talent applied to visual art, architecture, science and politics too, all of which blossomed and developed in 19th century Vienna, sowing the seeds of modernism in each of those fields.

As we'll hear during this talk, Vienna's proximity to nature, its politics and burgeoning middle classes were all factors in its cultural blossoming, but most important was Vienna's geographical location at the heart of the Habsburg Empire.

With slides showing Viennese art and architecture as well as music by Mozart, Beethoven, Brahms, Schubert and Johann Strauss, this talk brings to life Vienna in its hevday.
